So you can see I salvaged 58 coins out of the hundreds from the 3 one pound bags. I do believe I can fully recover my financial investment and lively more. However, would I do this experiment again? Not likely, as the time investment especially the research is probably too much given the minimal financial return on investment. It was a good history and geography lesson though given the wide range of time periods and countries that were involved. It's very difficult to translate the Chinese, Israel, and Arabic coins, and usually I simply give up on them all together. It would be a super exercise for the schools to conduct though!
